County Manager/Airport Director, will appear before the Board to present Change Order #3 regarding the Airport Capital Project #7548 (NC Forestry Service Aviation Hangar Complex Project). The Duplin County Airport commission reviewed and approved Change Order #3 at their August 24, 2021 board meeting and recommends approval to the Duplin County Board of Commissioners. The Duplin County Board of Commissioners met at 6:00 p.m. on Monday, August 16th, 2021 in the Commissioners Room located at 225 Seminary Street, Kenansville, NC.

Present: Commissioners: Dexter Edwards, Wayne Branch, and Kennedy Thompson, Elwood Garner, and Jesse Dowe, III.

Also Present: Mr. Davis H. Brinson, County Manager/Clerk to the Board; Mr. Tim Wilson, County Attorney; Ms. Tracy Chestnutt, Finance Officer; and Mrs. Trisha-Ann Hoskins, Administrative Officer.

Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Edwards.

Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance

Invocation was given by Mr. George Futrelle, Asst. County Manager/Airport Director. The Board then led those in attendance in the pledge of allegiance to the flag of the United States of America.

Approval of the Meeting Agenda

Chairman Edwards asked if the members of the Board approved of the proposed meeting agenda and if any member or the County Manager/Clerk to the Board wished to make any changes or additions to the agenda.

Motion was made by Commissioner Thompson, seconded by Commissioner Branch, carried unanimously to approve the August 16th, 2021 meeting agenda.

Mr. Davis H. Brinson, County Manager and Clerk to the Board, appeared before the Board to request that the Board appoint Mrs. Trisha-Ann Hoskins as the Deputy Clerk to the Board of Commissioners to assist the Clerk. The Deputy Clerk to the Board will serve the Clerk in his job functions and act in his absence by assuming responsibilities required to continue the operation of the office including preparing agendas for Board meetings, gathering information for meeting agenda packets, and notifying Commissioners, appropriate County staff, the news media, and other interested parties of dates and times of board meetings and attending Board meetings to keep a full and accurate account and record the proceedings of the Board. The Deputy Clerk will also assist the Clerk in keeping up-to-date information on various County boards and commissions, coordinating meetings for the Commissioners and other officials; and in answering inquiries.

Motion was made by Commissioner Dowe, seconded by Commissioner Branch, carried unanimously to appoint Mrs. Trisha-Ann Hoskins as Deputy Clerk to the Board of Commissioners.

Angel Venecia, Director of Public Transportation, appeared before the Board to present and respectfully request the Board approve the submission of applications for the FY23 5311

CTP Grants- Admin (\$242,263) and Capital (\$217,685-replace three (3) transit vehicles and purchase new tablets for vehicles), and the 5310 Elderly and Disabled Mobility Grant (\$40,000) for the annual request for Federal and state funds in support of Duplin County's Public Transportation System.

Motion was made by Commissioner Garner, seconded by Commissioner Dowe, carried unanimously to submit applications on behalf of the Duplin County Public Transportation Department for FY23 Federal and State Community Transportation Program Grants for both 5311-Administrative and Capital Projects; and 5310-Elderly and Disabled Mobility Funding.

Angel Venecia, Director of Public Transportation, appeared before the Board to request that the Board schedule a public hearing to receive public comments on the submission of applications for the FY23 5311 CTP Grants- Admin (\$242,263) and Capital (\$217,685-replace three (3) transit vehicles and purchase new tablets for vehicles), and the 5310 Elderly and Disabled Mobility Grant (\$40,000) for the annual request for federal and state funds in support of Duplin County's Public Transportation System.

Motion was made by Commissioner Branch, seconded by commissioner Garner, carried unanimously to hold a public hearing on September 7th, 2021 to receive public comments on the submission of applications on behalf of the Duplin County Public Transportation Department for FY23 Federal and State Community Transportation Program Grants for both 5311-Administrative and Capital Projects; and 5310-Elderly and Disabled Mobility Funding.

Tracy Chestnutt, Finance Officer, appeared before the Board to present general information on the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), to discuss the expenditure of ARPA funds for the support of public health and to also discuss employee premium pay. The County will receive \$11,409,751 in ARPA funds as a result of the economic impact of the coronavirus pandemic. First, Ms. Chestnutt spoke to the Board regarding revenue replacement funds and advised that she was still waiting on guidance from the US Treasury on that issue. Secondly, she advised that ARPA allows for the support of public health expenditures which includes capital expenditures to upgrade medical facilities. Therefore, the County Manager and Finance Officer recommend the replacement of antiquated HVAC (heating, ventilation and air conditioning) systems at the Duplin County Health Department which will improve air circulation in the Health Department. It is also recommended that additional ARPA funds be used to purchase a remote internet access point (aka plum case) to be used at off-site testing and vaccine events. Ms. Chestnutt also discussed the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) premium pay information based on the recommendation made at the last meeting by the County Manager and Finance Officer to give county employees a bonus. The Board was advised that the US Treasury has issued an interim final rule concerning premium pay, and have advised that ARPA funds may be used by recipients to provide premium pay to eligible workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 pandemic. Ms. Chestnutt provided the Board with the definition of and information on essential work, eligible work and the measurement period of payments based on US Treasury guidance. She stated that she had been asked to do some research into the premium pay by Commissioner Garner relevant to giving a larger amount of premium pay to those employees who worked during vaccine clinics and testing events. Ms. Chestnutt advised that she thought under the definitions of essential workers and eligible work there were many other workers who were at heightened risk for example: sworn law enforcement officers, jailers, jail cooks, 911 telecommunicators, EMTs, paramedics, in-home aids, emergency management, housekeeping staff, nutrition site attendants, health care workers employed by the Health Dept., and adult and child protective services social workers. Ms. Chestnutt asked the Board for guidance as to who to include on the list if the Board was going to entertain a tiered approach to the premium pay and also on possibly prorating the premium pay based on the time the employee worked from March 3, 2020 until the point the premium pay is issued. Chairman Edwards asked for action on the first request from the Finance Officer regarding the expenditure of ARPA funds to support public health expenditures by replacing the HVAC system at the Health Department and by purchasing a remote internet access point box.

Motion was made by Commissioner Thompson, seconded by Commissioner Dowe, carried unanimously to authorize the Finance Officer to budget ARPA funds and authorize the use of \$70,000 for the support of public health expenditures.

The Board then discussed the premium pay and the tiered approach based on employee levels of exposure. The County Manager cautioned the Board that a lot of employees will not believe the tiered approach is fair and that it was very difficult for he and Ms. Chestnutt to draw a line as to who belongs in each tier. He stated that he thought the best approach was to give all employees the same amount of premium pay. The three recommendations given the Board to consider were as follows:

- 1. Pay all full time and part time employees as of the date of the approval a bonus of \$2,542.37 which will provide a net deposit of \$1,500.00. The estimated pay date is September 3rd if approved on August 16, 2021. Estimated Cost: \$1,640,157 for 539 employees.
- 2. Pay all full and part time employees as of the date of approval a bonus of \$4,237.29 for sectors deemed critical to protect the health and well-being of residents. The following employees are deemed critical to protect the health and well-being of resident: sworn law enforcement officers, jailers, jail cooks, 911 telecommunicators, EMTs, paramedics, in-home aids, emergency management, housekeeping staff, nutrition site attendants, health care workers employed by the Health Dept., and adult and child protective services social workers. All remaining employees will be paid a bonus of \$2,542.37 including department heads in all departments. The bonus will provide a net deposit of \$2,500 and \$1,500 respectively. The same pay dates will apply as above. Estimated Cost: \$2,155,416 for 539 employees
- 3. Pay all full and part time employees as of the date of approval a bonus of \$4,237.29 for sectors deemed critical to protect the health and well-being of residents. The following employees are deemed critical to protect the health and well-being of resident: sworn law enforcement officers, jailers, jail cooks, 911 telecommunicators, EMTs, paramedics, in-home aids, emergency management, housekeeping staff, nutrition site attendants, health care workers employed by the Health Dept., and adult and child protective services social workers. All remaining employees will be paid a

bonus of \$2,542.37 including department heads in all departments. The bonus will provide a net deposit of \$2,500 and \$1,500 respectively for employees eligible for a full bonus. Employees will receive a prorated gross deposit based on the number of months they have worked from March 3, 2020 through the approval date. The same pay dates will apply as above. Estimated Cost: \$1,859,787 for 539 employees

The Board discussed the tiered approach and also the prorating of the bonus pay. After much discussion, the Board took the following action.

Motion was made by Commissioner Thompson, seconded by Commissioner Branch, carried unanimously to approve the bonus as laid out in option three (3) with all department heads over the employees deemed essential to be included in the net \$2,500 bonus category.

The bonus payroll will be deposited on September 3, 2021, as a separate payroll deposit.

Elizabeth Stalls, County Planner, appeared before the Board to discuss the Duplin County Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance that was last updated and adopted on April 16, 2018. Since then, changes to chapters of the NC General Statutes have necessitated the need to update our ordinance with text amendments (no substantial changes) to reference the new NCGS Articles & Chapters. For example, the 2018 ordinance's reference for Articles in Chapter 153A have been replaced in the 2021 ordinance with references for Articles in Chapter 160D. Duplin County must adopt the updated ordinance with the text amendments.

Motion was made by Commissioner Thompson, seconded by Commissioner Branch, carried unanimously to adopt the updated Duplin County Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance as presented and to authorize the Chairman to sign same.

Tracey Simmons-Kornegay, Health Director, appeared before the Board to present the Agreement Addendum Revision #1, which provides additional funds in order to include family care and behavioral health facilities as additional facility types that are served by the Regional Prevention Support Teams (RPST). This additional funding supports these teams and ensures their success in providing on-site infection prevention and control assistance, training, and consultation to all types of post-acute care facilities, particularly those facility types that do not have trained medical staff. The goal of the RPSTs is to reduce the introduction of disease through on-site training and consultation with facility staff in the use of evidence-based infection control procedures consistent with applicable CDC, CMS and HHS guidance. This initiative is particularly important for residential facilities that do not typically have health care professionals on staff, RPSTs are based in each of the 10 public health regions with operational and fiscal responsibilities managed by one lead local public health department in each region (Duplin County belongs to Region 8 which is comprised of 9 counties in the southeastern portion of NC), and supported by NC DHHS/DPH project management and program oversight. The lead health department is identified collaboratively between NC DHHS/DPH and the public health regions. Each RPST has a prevention coordinator and additional training staff based upon the number of Nursing Home and Adult Care Home beds in each region. The health department has a staffing agreement with the North Carolina Alliance of Public Health Agencies (NCAPHA). Training for the RPSTs is

provided by the Division of Public Health in collaboration with the University of North Carolina's Statewide Program for Infection Control and Epidemiology (UNC SPICE).

Motion was made by Commissioner Garner, seconded by Commissioner Thompson, carried unanimously to accept the ED Regional Prevention Support Team (AA 545 Revision #1) for \$165,622 (totaling \$413,652)) and approve the budget amendment for FY 2021-2022.

Tracey Simmons-Kornegay, Health Director, appeared before the Board to present the Agreement Addendum (AA), which provides temporary funding for the Duplin County Health Department to hire one (1) Public Health Nurse (PHN) School Health Liaison for the coordination of COVID-19 screening, testing, and vaccine administration efforts, and to coordinate other school health/public health services as described in the Memorandum of Agreements referenced in the Attachment A, Paragraph B of the Agreement Addendum for FY22 351 Child Health. The service period for this AA is from June 1, 2021 through May 31, 2022.

Motion was made by Commissioner Thompson, seconded by Commissioner Garner, carried unanimously to accept the ELC Reopening Schools SH Liaison (AA 361) for \$115,000.00 and to approve to create one (1) full-time Public Health Nurse II grant funded employee position for FY 2021-2022 at a Grade 73 and approve the associated budget amendment for FY 2021-2022.

Pamela Brame, Director of Personnel, appeared before the Board to discuss the nature of the COVID Survey that was sent out to all Duplin County employees on August 10th, 2021 for voluntary participation in order gauge employee support for face coverings/masks and to determine the reservations employees may have about the COVID vaccine, as well as other relative information. This was done so the County Commissioners, County Manager, and County Attorney, may better understand their employees, where Duplin County is as far as COVID-19 is concerned and what further action may need to be taken to protect citizens of Duplin County. The survey revealed that out of 191employees who participated in the survey about COVID-19, the views both for and against the vaccine were pretty much evenly split, as well as on mask mandates. The results collectively showed positive feedback regarding how County government and its leaders have handled the response to the pandemic. Based on the results of the survey, it was determined that returning to the original mask mandate, regardless of vaccination status, would be beneficial and deemed fair by the majority of county employees who participated in the survey. Human Resources Director Brame requested that a mask mandate be reinstated by end of day, Friday, August 20th, 2021. The Board was also informed that the survey was taken down after it was shared on a social media platform to protect the integrity of the surveyed responses-- being from county employees only. A status report was given by Tracey Simmons-Kornegay, Health Director, about the status of the COVID-19, Delta variant, and general infection rates in Duplin County, per the request of Commissioner Dowe. Tracey Simmons-Kornegay also confirmed that the wearing of the mask by everyone does decrease the rate of infection of all COVID-19 variations. This mask mandate for County employees would be enforceable through the Personnel Policy and could result in disciplinary action of employees who do not adhere to

this mandate. The general public will also be required to wear masks/face coverings in all County buildings, facilities and vehicles.

III. Scope of Work and Deliverables:

All of the activities the Local Health Department performs under this Agreement Addendum shall be informed by the NC DHHS COVID-19 Guidance for Health Care Providers and Local Health Departments.¹

For each of the five activities listed below (Paragraphs 1 through 5), the Local Health Department (LHD) shall identify and address one or more of the allowable activities listed, with an emphasis on testing and tracing:

1. <u>Testing and Tracing</u>: Establish or enhance ability to aggressively identify cases, conduct contact tracing and follow up, as well as implement recommended containment measures.

a. Enhanced testing and contact tracing including contact elicitation/identification, contact notification, and contact follow-up. Activities could include traditional contact tracing methods as well as healthcare-specific and other proximity/location-based methods.

2. Surveillance: Improve morbidity and mortality surveillance, including:

- a. Establish or enhance community-based surveillance i.e., surveillance of populations and individuals without severe illness, travel to high-risk locations, or contacts to known cases.
- b. Provide accurate accounting of COVID-19 associated deaths. Maintain electronic death reporting using the North Carolina Electronic Disease Surveillance System (NCEDSS).

3. Lab Capacity: Enhance laboratory testing and reporting capacity:

a. Establish or expand capacity to test all symptomatic individuals, and secondarily expand capacity to achieve community-based surveillance.

4. <u>Infection Control</u>: Prevent and control COVID-19 in healthcare settings and protect other vulnerable or high-risk populations:

- a. Assess and monitor infections in healthcare workers across the healthcare spectrum.
- b. Monitor and help implement mitigation strategies for COVID-19 in all high-risk healthcare facilities (e.g., hospitals, dialysis clinics, cancer clinics, nursing homes, other long-term care facilities).
- c. Monitor and help implement mitigation strategies for other high-risk employment settings (e.g., meat processing facilities), and congregate living settings (e.g., prisons, youth homes, shelters).

5. <u>Community Risk Assessment</u>: Improve understanding of jurisdictional communities with respect to COVID-19 risk:

a. Build understanding of population density and high-risk population density (i.e., \geq 65 years, those with underlying health conditions, households with limited English fluency, healthcare seeking behavior, populations without insurance, and those near or below the poverty level).

IV. Performance Measures/Reporting Requirements:

1. Performance Measures

a. **Performance Measure # 1:** Via the NCCOVID, the LHD shall report cases of COVID-19 including deaths within 30 days of receipt of the report to the state disease registrar.

- b. Performance Measure # 2: Via the outbreak module within NCCOVID and the REDCap cluster/outbreak reporting tool, the LHD shall report COVID-19 activity (decline, no change, and increase) in high-risk healthcare facilities (e.g., nursing homes, dialysis centers, long-term care facilities) and congregate living settings (e.g., prisons, youth homes, shelters) within 2 days of receiving notification of an outbreak/cluster.
- c. Performance Measure #3: Using the COVID-19 Community Team Outreach (CCTO) Tool software, the LHD shall report close contacts to COVID-19 for at least 60% of people infected with COVID-19.
- d. Performance Measure #4: Using the COVID-19 Community Team Outreach (CCTO) Tool software, the LHD shall complete the Final Monitoring Outcome variable for 90% of contacts entered after 14 days.

- a. The LHD shall complete a Monthly Financial Report each month via the Smartsheet dashboard. These monthly financial reports will report on the prior month, with the due dates posted on the Smartsheet dashboard. The first financial report is to report for June 2021 and is due by July 22, 2021.
- b. The LHD shall complete a Program Report each quarter via the Smartsheet dashboard. These quarterly program reports will report on the prior quarter, with the due dates posted on the Smartsheet dashboard. The Service Quarters for these quarterly program reports are defined as:
 - Aprîl June 2021 *
 - July September 2021
 - October December 2021

Performance Monitoring and Quality Assurance: V.

- 1. The TATP Nurse Supervisor will review the Local Health Department's program performance through reporting done quarterly by the LHD and by a quarterly review of reports pulled from the NCCOVID, the REDCap cluster/outbreak reporting tool, and the CCTO tool.
- 2. If the assessment results in compliance concerns, the TATP Nurse Supervisor shall conduct conference calls with the Local Health Department to provide technical assistance in order to rectify the concerns.

Funding Guidelines or Restrictions: VI.

- Requirements for pass-through entities: In compliance with 2 CFR §200.331 Requirements for pass-through entities, the Division of Public Health provides Federal Award Reporting Supplements to the Local Health Department receiving federally funded Agreement Addenda.
 - a. Definition: A Supplement discloses the required elements of a single federal award. Supplements address elements of federal funding sources only; state funding elements will not be included in the Supplement. Agreement Addenda (AAs) funded by more than one federal award will receive a disclosure Supplement for each federal award.
 - b. Frequency: Supplements will be generated as the Division of Public Health receives information for federal grants. Supplements will be issued to the Local Health Department throughout the state fiscal year. For federally funded AAs, Supplements will accompany the original AA. If

AAs are revised and if the revision affects federal funds, the AA Revisions will include Supplements. Supplements can also be sent to the Local Health Department even if no change is needed to the AA. In those instances, the Supplements will be sent to provide newly received federal grant information for funds already allocated in the existing AA.

- 2. integration of laboratory with epidemiology and health information systems, thus maximizing the public health impact of available resources. These additional resources, by law, are intended to "prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus" by supporting testing, case investigation and contact tracing, surveillance, containment, and mitigation. Such activities may include support for workforce, epidemiology, use by employers, elementary and secondary schools, child care facilities, institutions of higher education, long-term care facilities, or in other settings, scale up of testing by public health, academic, commercial, and hospital laboratories, and community-based testing sites, mobile testing units, health care facilities, and other entities engaged in COVID–19 testing, and other activities related to COVID–19 testing, case investigation and contact tracing, surveillance, containment, and mitigation (including interstate compacts or other mutual aid agreements for such purposes).

III. Scope of Work and Deliverables:

All of the activities the Local Health Department performs under this Agreement Addendum shall be informed by the NC DHHS COVID-19 Guidance for Health Care Providers and local health departments.¹

For each of the six activities listed below (Paragraphs 1 through 6), the Local Health Department (LHD) shall identify and address one or more of the allowable activities listed, with an emphasis on testing and tracing:

1. Enhance Laboratory, Surveillance, Informatics and other Workforce Capacity

- a. Build expertise for healthcare and community outbreak response and infection prevention and control (IPC) among local health departments.
- b. Train and hire staff to improve the capacities of the epidemiology and informatics workforce to effectively conduct surveillance and response of COVID-19 (including contact tracing) and other conditions of public health significance.
- e. Build expertise to support management of the COVID-19 related activities within the jurisdiction (e.g., additional leadership, program and project managers, budget staff).
- d. Increase capacity for timely data management, analysis, and reporting for COVID-19 and other conditions of public health significance.

2. Strengthen Community Laboratory Testing

- a. Establish or expand capacity to quickly, accurately and safely test for SARS-CoV-2 among all symptomatic individuals, and secondarily expand capacity to achieve community-based surveillance, including testing of asymptomatic individuals.
 - 1) Strengthen ability to quickly scale testing as necessary to ensure that optimal utilization of existing and new testing platforms can be supported to help meet increases in testing demand in a timely manner.
 - 2) Build local capacity for testing of SARS-CoV-2 including within high-risk settings or in vulnerable populations that reside in their communities.
- b. Enhance laboratory testing capacity for SARS-CoV-2 outside of public health laboratories.
 - Establish or expand capacity to coordinate with public/private laboratory testing providers, including those that assist with surge and with testing for high-risk environments.

- 2) Secure and/or utilize mobile laboratory units, or other methods to provide point-of-care (POC) testing at public health-led clinics or non-traditional test sites (e.g., homeless shelters, food processing plants, prisons, Long Term Care Facilities [LTCFs]).
- c. Enhance data management and analytic capacity in public health laboratories to help improve efficiencies in operations, management, testing, and data sharing.
 - 1) Improve efficiencies in laboratory operations and management using data from throughput, staffing, billing, supplies, and orders.
 - 2) Improve the capacity to analyze laboratory data to help understand and make informed decisions about issues such as gaps in testing and community mitigation efforts. Data elements such as tests ordered and completed (including by device/platform), rates of positivity, source of samples, type will be used to create data visualizations that will be shared with the public, state health department, and community partners.

3. Advance Electronic Data Exchange at Public Health Labs

- Enhance and expand laboratory information infrastructure, to improve jurisdictional visibility on laboratory data (tests performed) from all testing sites and enable faster and more complete data exchange and reporting.
 - 1) Enhance laboratory test ordering and reporting capability.
 - a) 100% of results must be reported with key demographic variables including age/gender/race via NCCOVID.
 - b) Report all testing to the state health department using NCCOVID.

4. Improve Surveillance and Reporting of Electronic Health Data

- a. Use NCCOVID to ensure complete, up-to-date, automated reporting of morbidity and mortality to NC DPH of COVID-19 and other conditions of public health significance by:
 - 1) Establishing or enhancing community-based surveillance, including surveillance of vulnerable populations, individuals without severe illness, those with recent travel to high-risk locations, or who are contacts to known cases.
 - Monitoring changes to daily incidence rates of COVID-19 and other conditions of public health significance at the county or zip code level to inform community mitigation strategies.
- b. Establish complete, up-to-date, timely, automated reporting of individual-level data through electronic case reporting to NC DPH via NCCOVID
 - 1) At the health department, enhance capacity to work with testing facilities to onboard and improve electronic laboratory reporting (ELR), including to receive data from new or non-traditional testing settings. Use alternative data flows and file formats (e.g., CSV or XLS) to help automate where appropriate. In addition to other reportable results, this should include all COVID-19/SARS-CoV-2-related testing data (i.e., tests to detect SAR-CoV-2 including serology testing).
 - 2) Assist NC DPH in the process of automating the receiving of electronic health record (EHR) data, including electronic case reporting (eCR) and fast healthcare interoperability resources (FHIR)-based eCR to generate initial case reports as specified by NC DPH for the reportable disease within 24 hours and to update over time within 24 hours of a change in information contained in the CDC-directed case report, including death.
 - 3) Utilize eCR data to ensure data completeness, establish comprehensive morbidity and mortality surveillance, and help monitor the health of the community and inform decisions for the delivery of public health services.

- c. Improve understanding of capacity, resources, and patient impact at healthcare facilities through electronic reporting.
 - 1) Assist NC DPH with required expansion of reporting facility capacity, resources, and patient impact information, such as patients admitted and hospitalized, in an electronic, machine-readable, as well as human-readable visual, and tabular manner, to achieve 100% coverage in jurisdiction and include daily data from all acute care, long-term care, and ambulatory care settings. Use these data to monitor facilities with confirmed cases of COVID-19/SARS-CoV-2 infection or with COVID-like illness among staff or residents and facilities at high risk of acquiring COVID-19/SARS-CoV-2 cases and COVID-like illness among staff or residents.
- d. Enhance systems for flexible data collection, reporting, analysis, and visualization.
 - 1) Make data on case, syndromic, laboratory tests, hospitalization, and healthcare capacity available on health department websites at the county/zip code level in a visual and tabular manner.
- e. Establish or improve systems to ensure complete, accurate and immediate (within 24 hours) data transmission to NCCOVID and open website available to the public by county and zip code, that allows for automated transmission of data to NC DPH via NCCOVID.
 - 1) Track via NC DETECT 100% of emergency department and outpatient visits for COVID-like illness, as well as other syndromes/illnesses, to CDC.
 - Submit all case reports in an immediate, automated way to CDC for COVID-19/SARS-CoV-2 and other conditions of public health significance with associated required data fields via NCCOVID.
 - 3) Provide accurate accounting of COVID-19/SARS-CoV-2 associated deaths. Establish electronic, automated, immediate death reporting to CDC with associated required data fields via NCCOVID.
 - 4) Report requested COVID-19/SARS-CoV-2-related data, including line level testing data (negatives, positives, indeterminants, serology, antigen, nucleic acid) daily by county or zip code to NCCOVID.
 - 5) Establish these systems in such a manner that they may be used on an ongoing basis for surveillance of, and reporting on, other threats to the public health and conditions of public health significance.
- f. Integrate existing LHD electronic health records (EHR) into CVMS Direct.
 - CVMS is the COVID-19 Vaccine Management System; CVMS Direct is an integration solution offering for Providers to connect COVID-19 vaccination records with CVMS. Providers submit a standardized flat file from their Electronic Health Records (EHRs) that pass through the Health Information Exchange (HIE) and are loaded directly to CVMS. This NC COVID-19 Vaccine Reporting file (NCVR) contains patient information that complies with today's CVMS workflow across patient registration and vaccination recording, along with appropriate inventory reduction.

Before the LHD can use the CVMS Direct integration solution, the LHD will need to finalize legal agreements with the HIE, establish connectivity, complete file validations, and pass testing criteria before they can use the CVMS Direct integration. The North Carolina Health Information Exchange Authority (NC HIEA) is responsible for CVMS Direct. Any local health department interested in using CVMS Direct will need to contact NC HIEA at hiea@nc.gov.

5. Use Laboratory Data to Enhance Investigation, Response and Prevention

a. Use laboratory data to initiate case investigations, conduct contact tracing and follow-up, and implement containment measures.

- Conduct necessary contact tracing including contact elicitation/identification, contact
 notification, and contact follow-up. Activities could include traditional contact tracing
 and/or proximity/location- based methods, as well as methods adapted for healthcarespecific and congregate settings.
- 2) Utilize tools (e.g., geographic information systems and methods) that assist in the rapid mapping and tracking of disease cases for timely and effective epidemic monitoring and response, incorporating laboratory testing results and other data sources.
- 3) Identify cases and exposure to COVID-19 in high-risk settings or within vulnerable populations to target mitigation strategies.
 - a) Assess and monitor infections in healthcare workers across the healthcare spectrum.
 - b) Monitor cases and exposure to COVID-19 to identify need for targeted mitigation strategies to isolate and prevent further spread within high-risk healthcare facilities (e.g., hospitals, dialysis clinics, cancer clinics, nursing homes, and other LTCFs).
 - c) Monitor cases and exposure to COVID-19 to identify need for targeted mitigation strategies to isolate and prevent further spread within high-risk employment settings (e.g., meat processing facilities), congregate living settings (e.g., prisons, youth homes, shelters), and educational settings (e.g., K-12 schools, colleges and universities).
 - d) Work with NC DPH to build local capacity for reporting, rapid containment and prevention of COVID-19/SARS-CoV-2 within high-risk settings or in vulnerable populations that reside in their communities.
- b. Implement prevention strategies in high-risk settings or within vulnerable populations (including tribal nations) including proactive monitoring for asymptomatic case detection and increasing opportunities for vaccination of historically marginalized populations and the community. Continue working collaboratively with partners including consideration of funding to address health equity needs of the community. Examples of partners may include but are not limited to:
 - 1) Tribal affiliates and community-based organizations colleges and universities;
 - 2) Occupational health settings for large employers;
 - 3) Churches or religious or faith-based institutions;
 - 4) Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs), including Community Health Centers (CHCs);
 - 5) Pharmacies;
 - 6) Long-term care facilities (LTCFs), including independent living facilities, assisted living centers, and nursing homes;
 - 7) Organizations and businesses that employ critical workforce;
 - 8) First responder organizations;
 - 9) Non-traditional providers and locations that serve high-risk populations; and other partners that serve underserved populations.
- c. Build capacity for infection prevention and control in LTCFs (e.g., at least one Infection Preventionist [IP] for every facility) and outpatient settings.
 - 1) Build capacity to safely house and isolate infected and exposed residents of LTCFs and other congregate settings.
 - 2) Develop interoperable patient safety information exchange systems.
- d. Assist with enrollment of all LTCFs into NHSN.

- e. Increase Infection Prevention and Control (IPC) assessment capacity onsite using tele-ICAR.
- f. Perform preparedness assessment to ensure interventions are in place to protect high-risk populations.
 - 1) Coordinate as appropriate with federally funded entities responsible for providing health services to vulnerable populations (e.g., tribal nations and federally qualified health centers).

6. Coordinate and Engage with Partners

- a. Partner with NC DPH to establish or enhance testing for COVID-19/SARS-CoV-2.
 - 1) Acquire equipment and staffing to conduct testing for COVID-19/SARS-CoV-2.
 - 2) Support community partners to conduct appropriate specimen collection and/or testing within their jurisdictions.
- b. Partner with local, regional, or national organizations or academic institutions to enhance capacity for infection control and prevention of COVID-19/SARS-CoV-2.
 - 1) Build infection prevention and control and healthcare outbreak response expertise in the LHD.
 - 2) Partner with academic medical centers and schools of public health to develop regional centers for IPC consultation and support services.

IV. Performance Measures/Reporting Requirements:

1. Performance Measures

- a. **Performance Measure # 1:** The LHD shall have a COVID-19 Testing Plan to ensure access to COVID-19 testing for all symptomatic persons and for those who have had close contact to a known or suspected case of COVID-19 as defined by the CDC, and for those who request or require testing.
- b. Performance Measure # 2: Via the NCCOVID, the LHD shall report cases of COVID-19 including deaths within 30 days of receipt of the report to the state disease registrar.
- c. Performance Measure # 3: Via the outbreak module within NCCOVID and the REDCap cluster/outbreak reporting tool, the LHD shall report COVID-19 activity (decline, no change, and increase) in high-risk healthcare facilities (e.g., nursing homes, dialysis centers, LTCFs) and congregate living settings (e.g., prisons, youth homes, shelters) within 2 days of receiving notification of an outbreak/cluster.
- d. **Performance Measure** #4; Using the COVID-19 Community Team Outreach (CCTO) Tool software, the LHD shall report close contacts to COVID-19 for at least 50% of people infected with COVID-19.
- e. **Performance Measure #5:** Using the COVID-19 Community Team Outreach (CCTO) Tool software, the LHD shall complete the Final Monitoring Outcome variable for 90% of contacts entered after 14 days.

2. Reporting Requirements

The reporting below shall be provided by the LHD to DPH via the Smartsheet dashboard, which can be accessed at https://app.smartsheet.com/b/publish?EQBCT=2a6fdcc2c5da4b39834c3a154e4916cd.

a. The LHD shall complete a **Monthly Financial Report** each month via the Smartsheet dashboard. These monthly financial reports will report on the prior month, with the due dates posted on the Smartsheet dashboard. The first financial report is to report for June 2021 and is due by July 22, 2021.

- b. The LHD shall complete a **Program Report** each quarter via the Smartsheet dashboard. These quarterly program reports will report on the prior quarter, with the due dates posted on the Smartsheet dashboard. The first program report is to report for April June 2021 and is due by July 22, 2021. The quarterly periods for these program reports are defined as:
 - April June 2021 *
 - July September 2021
 - October December 2021
 - January March 2022

c. The LHD shall complete a **COVID-19 Response Plan** via the Smartsheet dashboard. This response plan is to provide information related to the LHD's broader goals and partnerships for COVID-19 preparedness and response. The Smartsheet dashboard will present a series of questions to be answered in a short-answer format, with topics including aspects of testing, contact tracing, vaccination, equity, and preparedness in general. Information about the LHD's COVID-19 Testing Plan will be another topic contained within the COVID-19 Response Plan, and completing the COVID-19 Response Plan will fulfill the requirement listed above in Performance Measure #1.

The LHD will be providing responses for a <u>single COVID-19</u> Response Plan and this plan will meet the reporting requirements described under the FY22 Agreement Addenda for this Activity 543 and for Activity 716.

The COVID-19 Response Plan will receive DPH oversight from the DPH Branch staff members representing each relevant aspect. Any questions the LHD has should be directed to the DPH Division Director's Office at health serve and deliberate access.

DPH will add the **COVID-19 Response Plan questionnaire** to the Smartsheet dashboard by August 31, 2021. The LHD shall provide its responses no later than September 30, 2021.

V. Performance Monitoring and Quality Assurance:

- 1. The TATP Nurse Supervisor will review the Local Health Department's program performance through reporting done quarterly by the LHD and by a quarterly review of reports pulled from the NCCOVID, the REDCap cluster/outbreak reporting tool, and the CCTO tool.
- 2. If the assessment results in compliance concerns, the TATP Nurse Supervisor shall conduct conference calls with the Local Health Department to provide technical assistance in order to rectify the concerns.

VI. Funding Guidelines or Restrictions:

- 1. Requirements for pass-through entities: In compliance with 2 CFR §200.331 Requirements for pass-through entities, the Division of Public Health provides Federal Award Reporting Supplements to the Local Health Department receiving federally funded Agreement Addenda.
 - a. Definition: A Supplement discloses the required elements of a single federal award. Supplements address elements of federal funding sources only; state funding elements will not be included in the Supplement. Agreement Addenda (AAs) funded by more than one federal award will receive a disclosure Supplement for each federal award.
 - b. Frequency: Supplements will be generated as the Division of Public Health receives information for federal grants. Supplements will be issued to the Local Health Department throughout the state fiscal year. For federally funded AAs, Supplements will accompany the original AA. If AAs are revised and if the revision affects federal funds, the AA Revisions will include Supplements. Supplements can also be sent to the Local Health Department even if no change is

- needed to the AA. In those instances, the Supplements will be sent to provide newly received federal grant information for funds already allocated in the existing AA.
- 2. As the LHD is a subrecipient of a grant or cooperative agreement awarded by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) with funds made available under the Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2020 (P.L. 116-123); the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act, 2020 (the "CARES Act") (P.L. 116-136); and/or the Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act (P.L. 116-139) the LHD agrees as applicable to the award, to:
 - a. comply with existing and/or future directives and guidance from the HHS Secretary regarding
 - b. in consultation and coordination with HHS, provide, commensurate with the condition of the individual, COVID-19 patient care regardless of the individual's home jurisdiction and/or appropriate public health measures (e.g., social distancing, home isolation); and
 - e. assist the United States Government in the implementation and enforcement of federal orders related to quarantine and isolation. In addition, to the extent applicable, Recipient will comply with Section 18115 of the CARES Act, with respect to the reporting to the HHS Secretary of results of tests intended to detect SARS-CoV-2 or to diagnose a possible case of COVID-19. To reduce the spread of the SARS-CoV-2 virus and its variants, and bring an end to this pandemic, we need to vaccinate as many people as possible, as soon as possible. Planning and response require close collaboration among public and private sector partners, public health emergency response and emergency management, healthcare organizations, and healthcare industry groups within the community. A key component is community sustainability so that the LHD is prepared for a possible COVID-19 booster vaccination program and is prepared to implement influenza vaccination both seasonally and as part of pandemic preparedness.

III. Scope of Work and Deliverables:

The LHD shall:

- Vaccinate eligible populations according to the CDC COVID-19 Vaccination Program Provider Agreement.
- 2. Ensure designated staff are trained on:
 - a. COVID-19 vaccine management
 - b. storage and handling procedures
 - c. vaccine preparation
 - d. administration
 - e. proper procedures for facilitating vaccine transfers between providers, and
 - f. reporting requirements as required by NC DHHS/DPH and the CDC
- 3. Identify community vaccination providers (e.g., pharmacies, occupational health settings, doctors' offices) to combine efforts and implement strategies to vaccinate eligible populations with a focus on vaccine hesitant populations.
- 4. Conduct vaccination clinics that are open to the public. These clinics may be provisionally located at walk-through sites (churches, community centers, outdoor tents) or other settings such as mobile, curbside, or drive-through sites.
- 5. Ensure safe implementation of on-site, satellite, temporary, off-site, or other alternative vaccination clinics. Follow CDC guidance for planning vaccination clinics that includes clinical considerations such as social distancing, responding to medical emergencies, vaccine storage, handling, administration, and documentation (https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/hcp/admin/mass-clinic-activities/). Large-scale clinics, such as those held in arenas or stadiums require added logistical and technical considerations. Partners may need to be engaged to accomplish aspects of the local plan, such as National Guard, local law enforcement, local emergency management, local hospitals, and pharmacies.
- 6. Adjust clinic plans to accommodate a variety of scenarios due to vaccine hesitancy and no-show rates. Vaccine hesitancy includes many factors such as a lack of vaccine confidence, complacency about the virus, and the inconvenience of obtaining a vaccine. Focus activities to establish and build trust among hard-to-reach, high-risk, and underserved populations.
- 7. Educate the public and community at large on the benefits of receiving the COVID-19 vaccine and disseminate standardized information to the public and providers within the LHD's county or district. Foster trust in conversations with the public to address specific topics on vaccine hesitancy. Enhance existing community partnerships to assist in vaccination promotion. These partnerships may include a variety of community and faith-based organizations to reach hesitant at-risk populations, such as churches, barber shops, community health centers, refugee serving organizations, homeless shelters, jails/prisons, factories such as meat processing plants, other essential businesses, and migrant farms.

- 8. Estimate the resources needed to support COVID-19 vaccine administration and outreach activities and hire or reassign staff additional personnel to support these functions.
- 9. Procure supplies for the vaccination clinics, as needed. Examples of supplies to obtain include those items necessary to protect both staff and patients from COVID-19, such as:
 - a. hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol for hand hygiene
 - b. clinic sanitizing wipes and cleaning tools to allow for frequent cleaning of the clinic area
 - c. mask/face coverings for patients who do not have a mask
 - d. signage, tape, ropes, and cones for clinic workflow to encourage physical distancing and efficient one-way flow through the vaccination process
 - e. thermometers for checking each patient's temperature before entering the clinic
- 10. Store vaccine in proper vaccine storage equipment (e.g., refrigerators, freezers, portable storage units), and use CDC-approved digital data loggers for temperature monitoring of vaccine storage and handling units used for COVID-19 vaccine.
- 11. Follow relevant CDC vaccine transport requirements to prepare COVID-19 vaccines for transport from the LHD to off-site clinics. COVID-19 vaccine products are temperature-sensitive and must be stored and handled correctly to ensure efficacy and maximize shelf life. Proper storage and handling practices are critical to minimize vaccine loss and limit the risk of administering COVID-19 vaccine with reduced effectiveness.
- 12. Follow CDC's and COVID-19 vaccine manufacturer's cold chain storage and handling requirements.
- 13. Complete Attachments A and B with the signed Agreement Addendum:
 - a. Attachment A Budget Statement for the FY 2021-2022 Planned Use of Federal COVID-19 Vaccination Funds. It should list the expected expenses by category, including the dollar amount and a brief justification. IV. Performance Measures/Reporting Requirements:

- Report vaccine administration data on all vaccine recipients via the CVMS or other designated system as directed by the CDC COVID-19 Vaccination Program Agreement.
- 2. Track and report COVID-19 vaccine transfers and vaccine wastage/spoilage occurrences according to the NC DHHS/DPH guidelines.
- 3. Ensure designated staff receive training on COVID-19 vaccine administration, management, inventory, and reporting requirements as required by CDC and NC DHHS/DPH.
- 4. The LHD shall complete a **Monthly Financial Report** each month via the Smartsheet dashboard. These monthly financial reports will report on the prior month, with the due dates posted on the Smartsheet dashboard. The first financial report is to report for June 2021 and is due by July 22, 2021. Monthly Financial Reports are **not** required if the LHD is not receiving funds under this Agreement Addendum.
- 5. The LHD shall complete a **Program Report** each quarter via the Smartsheet dashboard. These quarterly program reports will report on the prior quarter, with the due dates posted on the Smartsheet dashboard. The first program report is to report for April June 2021 and is due by July 22, 2021. The quarterly periods for these program reports are defined as:
 - April June 2021 *
 - July September 2021
 - October December 2021
 - January March 2022

V. Performance Monitoring and Quality Assurance:

- 1. The Immunization Branch will monitor this Activity through review of reports, vaccine immunization data, and reporting data in CVMS or other designated reporting mechanism. Technical consultation to support LHDs in meeting these objectives will be provided as needed.
- 2. The Immunization Branch will monitor the LHD via either an in-person visit or a virtual visit.
- 3. If a CAP is needed, the LHD program monitor shall make every effort to work with the LHD on strategies to resolve issues and follow corrective action plans. If the plans are not followed and the LHD remains out of compliance after intervention and resources from DPH, the Agreement Addendum may be terminated, or funding may be reduced.

VI. Funding Guidelines or Restrictions:

- 1. Requirements for pass-through entities: In compliance with 2 CFR §200.331 Requirements for pass-through entities, the Division of Public Health provides Federal Award Reporting Supplements to the Local Health Department receiving federally funded Agreement Addenda.
 - a. Definition: A Supplement discloses the required elements of a single federal award. Supplements address elements of federal funding sources only; state funding elements will not be included in the Supplement. Agreement Addenda (AAs) funded by more than one federal award will receive a disclosure Supplement for each federal award.

II. Purpose:

This Activity is for the Local Health Department to work to prevent, prepare for, and respond to Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) by carrying out surveillance, epidemiology, laboratory capacity, infection control, mitigation, communications, and other preparedness and response activities.

III. Scope of Work and Deliverables:

All of the activities the Local Health Department performs under this Agreement Addenda shall be informed by the NC DHHS COVID-19 Guidance for Health Care Providers and Local Health Departments.¹ The Local Health Department (LHD) shall:

- 1. Implement and scale-up laboratory testing and data collection to enable identification and tracking of COVID-19 cases in the community with emphasis placed on priority populations as defined in NC DHHS guidance² to include health care workers, first responders, persons in high-risk congregate settings, and persons at a higher risk of severe illness, and immediate implementation of real-time reporting to PHP&R. This shall be accomplished by conducting one or more of the following activities:
 - a. Expand testing access in the community with a focus on persons who may expose vulnerable people.
 - b. Conducting surveillance to identify cases, report case data in a timely manner, identify contacts, characterize disease transmission, and track relevant epidemiologic characteristics including hospitalization and death.
 - c. Conducting surveillance to monitor virologic and disease activity in the community and healthcare settings, with emphasis on expanding contact tracing for high risk populations using traditional and non-traditional methods.
 - d. Implementing routine and enhanced surveillance to support the science base that informs public health interventions that mitigate the impact of COVID-19, including understanding of clinical characteristics; infection prevention and control practices; and other mitigation requirements.
 - e. Establishing or enhancing core epidemiological activities to support response such as risk assessment, case classification, analysis, visualization, and reporting.
 - f. Conduct surveillance to monitor disruption in the community caused by COVID-19 and related mitigation activities (e.g., school closures and cancellation of mass gatherings).
 - g. Conduct surveillance to monitor disruption in healthcare systems caused by COVID-19 (e.g., shortages of personal protective equipment).
- 2.  - ii. Emergency Public Information and Warning and Risk Communication, with emphasis on expanding communications and public education campaigns including digital platforms and call lines
- d. Domain 4: Countermeasures and Mitigation.
 - i. Nonpharmaceutical Interventions
 - ii. Quarantine and Isolation Support, with emphasis on isolation and quarantine of identified cases in high risk populations
 - iii. Distribution and Use of Medical Materiel
- e. Domain 5: Surge Management.
 - i. Surge Staffing
 - ii. Public Health Coordination with Healthcare Systems
 - ili. Infection Control
- f. Domain 6: Biosurveillance.
 - i. Public Health Surveillance and Real-time Reporting
 - ii. Public Health Laboratory Testing, Equipment, Supplies and Shipping
 - iii. Data Management

IV. Performance Measures/Reporting Requirements:

The Local Health Department shall:

- 1. Submit Monthly Expenditure Monitoring Reports (EMRs) to PHP&R. These EMRs are due via email (papers and decided and grey) to the PHP&R Program Manager no later than thirty days after the month ends.
- 2. Provide all plans and documents for review by PHP&R staff when requested. Plans and other documents must be consistent with state and federal requirements and must be specific to your local public health area.

V. Performance Monitoring and Quality Assurance:

PHP&R will provide technical support to the Local Health Department to meet the required and allowable activities defined in the CDC Interim Guidance document. Templates and best practices will be provided as needed on an ongoing basis. PHP&R staff will maintain open communication with the Local Health Department and will therefore, receive and respond to all questions related to the COVID-19 Crisis Response Cooperative Agreement.

PHP&R's Subrecipient Grants Monitor or PHP&R Program Manager's designee will review reports and may schedule and conduct on-site visits with the Local Health Department to assess compliance with CDC grant and Agreement Addendum requirements, financials, and/or provide consultative assistance.

Inadequate performance on the part of the Local Health Department directly impacts the capacity of North Carolina's ability in overall preparedness. In the event that performance is deemed inadequate or

non-compliant, PHP&R reserves the right to identify the county as "high risk," which may result in a reduction or suspension of funds.

While not necessarily an indicator of inadequate performance, a Local Health Department's inability to spend allocated funds will result in an assessment and potential recall of funds for re-allocation to other local health departments.

VI. Funding Guidelines or Restrictions:

- 1. Requirements for pass-through entities: In compliance with 2 CFR §200.331 Requirements for pass-through entities, the Division provides Federal Award Reporting Supplements to the Local Health Department receiving federally funded Agreement Addenda.
 - a. Definition: A Supplement discloses the required elements of a single federal award. Supplements address elements of federal funding sources only; state funding elements will not be included in the Supplement. Agreement Addenda (AAs) funded by more than one federal award will receive a disclosure Supplement for each federal award.
 - b. Frequency: Supplements will be generated as the Division receives information for federal grants. Supplements will be issued to the Local Health Department throughout the state fiscal year. For federally funded AAs, Supplements will accompany the original AA. If AAs are revised and if the revision affects federal funds, the AA Revisions will include Supplements. Supplements can also be sent to the Local Health Department even if no change is needed to the AA. In those instances, the Supplements will be sent to provide newly received federal grant information for funds already allocated in the existing AA.

2. Unallowable costs:

- a. Research
- b. Clinical care except as provided above in connection with Domain 4 activities.
- e. Publicity and propaganda (lobbying). Other than for normal and recognized executive-legislative relationships, no funds may be used for:
 - i. publicity or propaganda purposes, for the preparation, distribution, or use of any material designed to support or defeat the enactment of legislation before any legislative body
 - ii. the salary or expenses of any grant or contract recipient, or agent acting for such recipient, related to any activity designed to influence the enactment of legislation, appropriations, regulation, administrative action, or Executive order proposed or pending before any legislative body

Detailed guidance on this prohibition and additional guidance on lobbying for CDC recipients can be found under Additional Requirement 12: https://doi.org/10.1009/10.

- d. All unallowable costs cited in CDC-RFA-TP18-1802 remain in effect, unless specifically amended in the CDC Interim Guidance document, in accordance with 45 CFR Part 75 Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for HHS Awards.
- 3. PHP&R will distribute funds to the Local Health Department in amounts based on a formula developed to maximize COVID-19 prevention and mitigation actions to protect the citizens of North Carolina. Funds will be distributed through the Controller's Office based on standard DPH procedures. It is anticipated that the level of funding provided through this Agreement Addendum will not be enough to support all of the activities that a Local Health Department will undertake and that other resources may be necessary to meet the requirements.

- 4. Overlap in Projects, Budget Items, or Commitment of Effort
 - a. Funds cannot be used to supplant existing federal funds awarded by other federal sources.
 - b. Funds cannot be used to match funding on other federal awards.
- 5. PHP&R reserves the right to review any expenditure that is not in line with the purpose and scope of the funding source. After review of the expenditure PHP&R may reject the expenditure and then require the Local Health Department to further justify or to pay back the expense.

WITNESSETH:

That the LESSOR hereby leases to the LESSEE the premises in Duplin County identified as follows:

- 3. Duplin County Tax Parcel #09-F014, consisting of approximately 1.24 acres, as shown on the diagrams or survey marked "Exhibit C-1" and further described by a legal description marked "Exhibit C-2," which are attached hereto and made a part hereof;
- 4. Duplin County Tax Parcel #09-F039, consisting of approximately 1.38 acres, as shown on the diagrams or survey marked "Exhibit D-1" and further described by a legal description marked "Exhibit D-2," which are attached hereto and made a part hereof;
- 5. Duplin County Tax Parcel #09-F015, consisting of approximately 2.81 acres, as shown on the diagrams or survey marked "Exhibit E-1" and further described by a legal description marked "Exhibit E-2," which are attached hereto and made a part hereof;

This LEASE and MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT is executed upon the following terms and conditions:

- 1. TERM. For 12 months, which shall begin on the 1st day of June, 2021, and shall exist and continue until the 31st day of May, 2022, unless sooner terminated as hereinafter set forth.
- 2. RENT. - 9. WAIVER OF LIABILITY. The Lessor shall in no way be liable for any injury or damage to any person or property arising from the use of said leased premises by the Lessees.
- 10. GENERAL LIABILITY, PROPERTY & CASUALTY INSURANCE. Lessee shall obtain and maintain property and casualty insurance for the leased premises and shall provide a Certificate of Insurance to the Lessor upon execution of this Lease.
- 11. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This instrument contains the entire agreement and understanding between the parties and there are no oral understandings, terms or conditions, and no party has relied upon any representation, express or implied, not contained herein. 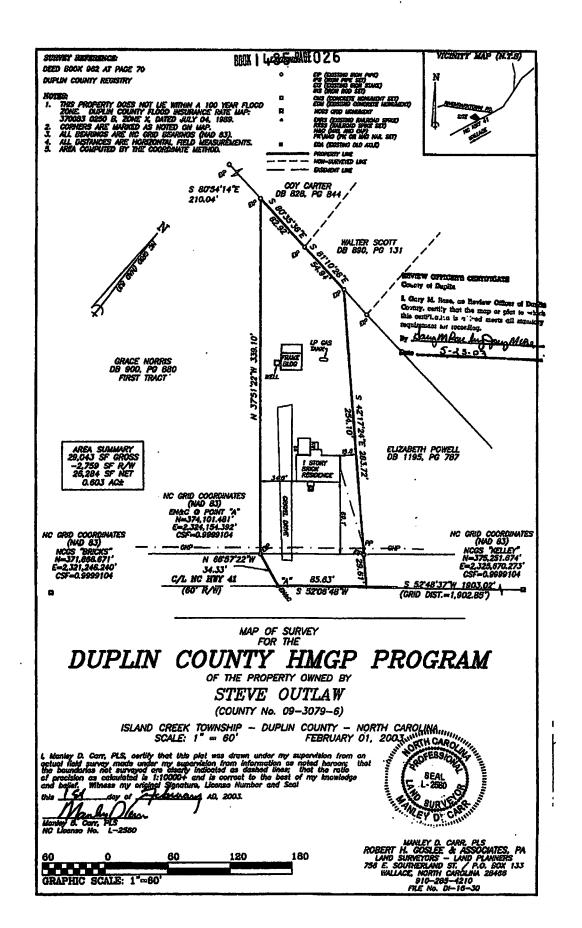

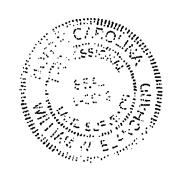

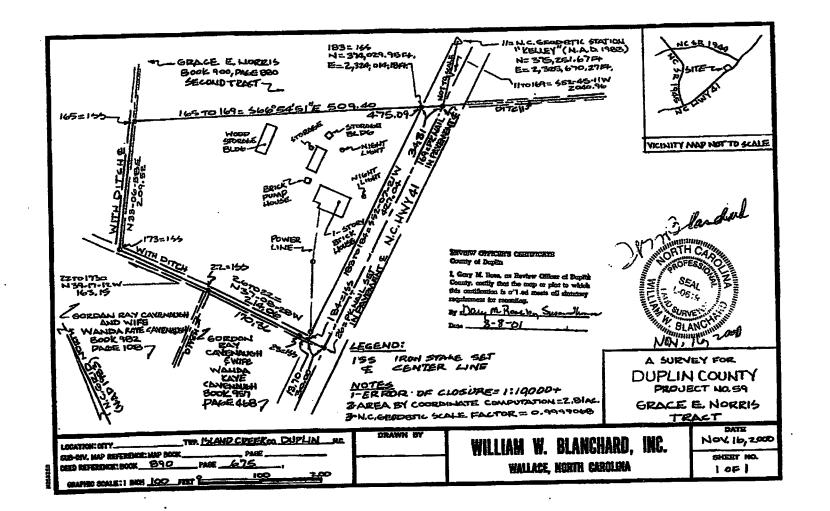

WITNESSETH:

That the LESSOR hereby leases to the LESSEE the premises commonly known as Duplin County Tax Parcels #09-F030 and #09-F043 located in the vicinity of 3873 & 3917 S.
